

- This weekend we celebrate Pentecost—the end of the Easter season and the “birthday of the Church” as the Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles...to give them understanding of the teaching of Jesus and courage to go out to preach the Gospel of Christ to the world.
- Remember that the descent of the Holy Spirit an actual historical event, not simply some symbol.
- And how can we know this? Because of the facts of history.
- Before Pentecost the apostles were hiding for their lives—trying not to be noticed.
- Their leader had just been crucified a few weeks ago, and religious authorities were hunting down his disciples.
- But the Holy Spirit then descends upon them...and all trace of fear vanishes. Then the apostles’ only concern becomes that Jesus is preached to the world.

- St. Paul had a similar transformation—going from persecuting the Church to being its greatest defender and evangelist in virtually the space of a moment...when Jesus appeared to him on the road to Damascus.

- These are historical events. Thus, it is unreasonable to believe that they did a 180 degree turnaround in a moment without some sort of remarkable event—going from cowardly fear to going out and preaching fearlessly in a moment.
- For the apostles, on Pentecost their eyes are opened, and they realized that hardship in this world is inconsequential compared to eternal life and pleasing God...and thus they go boldly into a hostile world...hated by many, assaulted, thrown into prison, beaten, whipped, cursed...and finally martyred.

- And they do this not only for a day or a week, but some of them for decades. WHY do this unless they understood and knew the overwhelming love of God, and thus the joy of pleasing Him by doing His will. Their sights were set on greater things.
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- We read of this in the Acts of the Apostles: *“when [the council] had called in the apostles, they beat them and charged them not to speak in the name of Jesus, and let them go. Then [the apostles] left the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer dishonor for the name. And every day in the temple and at home they did not cease teaching and preaching Jesus as the Christ.”* (Act 5:40-42 RSV)
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- As St. Paul would write: *“I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us.”* (Romans 8:18)
- And no doubt they remembered Jesus’ words: *“The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized...”* (Mark 10:39) *“... you will be hated by all for my name's sake. But he who endures to the end will be saved.”* (Matt 10:21-22)
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- Now “Pentecost” means “the fiftieth day”, and the Jewish Pentecost is 50 days after Passover, as the Christian Pentecost is 50 days after Easter.
- The Jewish Pentecost—more properly called the Feast of Weeks, or *Shavu’ot*—celebrates God giving the Law—the Ten Commandments—to Moses on Mt. Sinai 50 days after the Exodus from Egypt...freeing them not only from physical slavery, but also from spiritual bondage to idolatry and immorality.
- For Christians, Pentecost celebrates of the coming of the new, eternal law—which completes the old law...and the new law is the

understanding of the teaching of Christ which comes through Holy Spirit...who descended upon the Church that Pentecost day 2000 years ago.

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- In the story of the Tower of Babel in Genesis, God strikes sinful mankind which thought to make its name *apart* from God—and they begin to speak in all different languages...signifying the confusion which comes from living apart from the ways of God.
- But at Pentecost, the various peoples in Jerusalem for the feast all hear the apostles speaking in each person's own language—to show that the “people of God” is not limited to a certain race or nationality, but rather the Church is to embrace ALL peoples and nations.
- The Church's mission becomes the reunification of mankind by the language of Christ.
- As Jesus prayed to the Father the night before He died: “...*I am no more in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to thee. Holy Father, keep them in thy name, which thou hast given me, that they may be one, even as we are one. (Joh 17:11 RSV)*”
- We, the baptized...the confirmed...have now been sealed with that same Spirit which descended upon the apostles 2000 years ago... that very same Spirit of God who moved across the waters at Creation, who parted the Red Sea, who burned the 10 commandments upon tablets of stone...who touched our Blessed Mother's womb when she conceived Jesus.
- And with that seal of God is the assignment of a mission—to love God and neighbor above all...and so to seek the unity of humanity through charity and love.
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- So knowing this is our divine mission...and that our responsibility to try to accomplish that mission is no less than it was with the apostles... take an honest look at yourself today and ask:
- Am I really an active member of the Body of Christ? Am I fulfilling the role assigned to me by God...fulfilling MY mission?
- Through the Holy Spirit, we are made active members of Christ's Church...with all the strength and power necessary to be true soldiers of Christ...to help our fellow Christians—and ALL men—in our common struggle against evil.
- As St. Paul tells us: “...walk by the Spirit, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh; for these are opposed to each other... Now the works of the flesh are plain: fornication, impurity, licentiousness [lacking in moral restraint], idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, anger, selfishness, dissension, party spirit [factions], envy, drunkenness, carousing, and the like...those who do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God.” (Gal 5:16-21).
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- What are the signs that we are walking by the Holy Spirit?
- Paul tells us just a few verses later: “...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such there is no law. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires.” (Gal 5:22-24)
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- Isn't it striking how, as it says in the book of Ecclesiastes, that “there is nothing new under the sun”...and how that observation holds just as true today as when it was written.
- For millennia the world has tried to convince itself that “sex, drugs and rock-and-roll” and the pleasures of the flesh lead to fulfillment...even though history and experience teach us that love, joy, peace and truly good things come to us only by living a life in accordance with the will of God.

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- The Church's victory is inevitable...but the question each of us must answer is: Am I going to slink away from the fight and do my own thing apart from God (like those at the tower of Babel) ... or am I going to take up the cause—using the weapons of prayer, charity and faithfulness to God—and move forward to victory.
- For in this conflict, those who do not fight lose...but those who enter the battle wholeheartedly...following Christ our king and fortified by the Holy Spirit...have already won eternal life.

Reading 1

The whole world spoke the same language, using the same words.
While the people were migrating in the east,
they came upon a valley in the land of Shinar and settled there.
They said to one another,

Moses went up the mountain to God.

tell the Israelites:
You have seen for yourselves how I treated the Egyptians
and how I bore you up on eagle wings

and brought you here to myself.
Therefore, if you hearken to my voice and keep my covenant,
you shall be my special possession,
dearer to me than all other people,
though all the earth is mine.
You shall be to me a kingdom of priests, a holy nation.
That is what you must tell the Israelites."
So Moses went and summoned the elders of the people.
When he set before them
all that the LORD had ordered him to tell them,
the people all answered together,
"Everything the LORD has said, we will do."
On the morning of the third day
there were peals of thunder and lightning,
and a heavy cloud over the mountain,
and a very loud trumpet blast,
so that all the people in the camp trembled.

1 Cor 12:3b-7, 12-13

Brothers and sisters:

No one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit.
There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit;
there are different forms of service but the same Lord;
there are different workings but the same God
who produces all of them in everyone.

To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit
is given for some benefit.

As a body is one though it has many parts,
and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body,
so also Christ.

For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body,
whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons,
and we were all given to drink of one Spirit.

Gal 5:16-25

Brothers and sisters, live by the Spirit
and you will certainly not gratify the desire of the flesh.
For the flesh has desires against the Spirit,
and the Spirit against the flesh;
these are opposed to each other,
so that you may not do what you want.

But if you are guided by the Spirit, you are not under the law.
Now the works of the flesh are obvious:
immorality, impurity, lust, idolatry,
sorcery, hatreds, rivalry, jealousy,
outbursts of fury, acts of selfishness,
dissensions, factions, occasions of envy,

with its passions and desires.
If we live in the Spirit, let us also follow the Spirit.

On the evening of that first day of the week,
